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National Electrical Safety Month

Safety is the highest priority for Edgecombe-Martin County EMC, and as your local energy partner, we encourage our members to make safety a priority too. May is National Electrical Safety Month, but it's important to take safety precautions year round. Here are some simple tips:

DO:

- Unplug it. Appliances, tools and other devices are still connected to electricity when they are plugged in, even if they are turned off. Turn off AND unplug all electric devices when you're done using them.
- Inspect it. Examine electrical cords often for broken connectors, and throw away any worn cords. Also watch your wattage and only use light bulbs that don't exceed the maximum wattage listed on your lamp or fixture.
- Check it. Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) outlets should be used in any area where water and electricity could mix—including kitchens, bathrooms, garages and outdoors—and should be tested monthly. You should also check your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors once a month to ensure they are working properly.

DON'T:

- Overload it. Overloaded electrical circuits can cause residential fires. Never use extension cords or multi-outlet converters for appliances. All major appliances should be plugged directly into a wall outlet, and you should only plug one heat-producing appliance into an outlet at a time.
- Extend it. Extension cords are not a permanent solution. If you're using extension cords regularly, you may need extra outlets.
- Touch it. Never go near or drive over a power line. If you encounter a downed line, leave the area immediately and notify us. Never place ladders, poles or other items near power lines, and don't fly kites or drones near lines or substations.

Just as you have made changes at home, we have also taken proactive steps during this emergency to protect our members, communities and employees and ensure that there is no disruption to our operations or services.

By implementing remote working procedures and closing our lobby to walk-in traffic, we are doing our part to protect our communities, while also making sure that key personnel are in place to seamlessly continue operations and provide you with high-quality service. Our member service representatives are available to assist you at 252-823-2171 Monday through Friday between 8:00 a.m. and 5 p.m. Our field personnel have

Equally as important, we have coordinated with suppliers and partners to safeguard access to necessary components, materials and support resources. HVAC Service Reminder

The air conditioner is always the hardest working appliance during the summer months. For day-to-day comfort, we rely on our cooling system, be it at home or at the office. For that reason, it's imperative to have your HVAC system serviced before it starts getting too warm and humid.

Most members can expect to see their bills increase during the summer months as their air conditioners run longer and harder to cool the home to their desired temperature. Experts recommend that you keep your thermostat set at 78 degrees when your HVAC system is set to cool in order to keep energy consumption as low as possible.

Contrary to popular belief, increasing and decreasing the setting on your

thermostat daily usually does not save you money. It is best to keep your thermostat set at one temperature on a daily basis. Only increase the setting on your thermostat during the summer months if you plan on being away from your home for several days at a time.

You should also inspect and replace your return filters monthly if needed. Failing to change your air filters can cause your air conditioner to run longer and become less efficient. An efficient air conditioner means more money in your pocket due to lower electric bills.





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
