Over the past decade, our focus on monitoring and proactively addressing cybersecurity risks has become critical. Collaboration among cooperatives is a vital part of our cyber risk management process. Co-ops routinely collaborate with state and federal government intelligence agencies to address threats, ensuring swift responses to protect members' power and data.

Cyber-attacks can be one of the most expensive risks electric utilities face. Still, the threat to personal and financial data is more significant than to the physical grid itself. Every year, cybercrime costs companies billions of dollars in the U.S. alone. According to Bill West, vice president of underwriting at Federated Rural Electric Insurance Exchange, the average cyber insurance claim costs \$733,000.

Edgecombe-Martin County EMC consistently provides staff training to educate employees on identifying potential threats. Technology only provides about 10% of the protection, and humans interacting through the technology are responsible for the other 90%. Often, hackers target people rather than systems through phishing (emails designed to make you click a link) or social engineering (manipulating individuals into divulging confidential information or performing actions that compromise security).

At Edgecombe-Martin County EMC, our employees go through cybersecurity training annually and are tested through internal emails each month. Over 85% of data breaches involve a human element, with cybercriminals exploiting individuals through tactics like phishing, smishing, and vishing.

It's crucial to exercise caution when handling emails or clicking on links. At Edgecombe-Martin County EMC, we do not call requesting personal information or financial data from our members, nor will we send out a link requesting such sensitive details. We would send attachments if a member initiates a request for a copy of their bill or specific consumption data. A member may also request information about setting up a new service, and we would email them the information as well.

To enhance the security of your personal information and finances, refrain from sharing sensitive data with unverified individuals, whether online or over the phone. Remember that Edgecombe-Martin County EMC never solicits personal information or payments via telephone or the internet. Additionally, be vigilant when you come



across emails containing suspicious links or attachments (any link or attachment you did not expect to receive), as they could be spoofed or malicious. Always verify the legitimacy of emails before clicking on anything. Furthermore, ensure that you use strong, unique passwords for each account.

Cybersecurity is an ever-evolving challenge, and it requires everyone across the organization to be vigilant. It takes everybody working together to ensure the network is not compromised by simple actions, like clicking on malicious links or downloading viruses or other malware. Taking preventive measures and practicing proper cyber hygiene can decrease the odds of being hacked, preventing lost time and money.

At Edgecombe-Martin County EMC, we are committed to aggressively protecting our member data and maintaining a secure link between cyberspace and our physical systems to ensure the safety of our member's data and our electric grid.

The air conditioner is always the hardest working appliance during the summer months.



Experts recommend that you keep your thermostat set at 78 degrees when your HVAC system is set to cool in order to keep energy consumption as low as possible.

In order to provide safe, affordable, and reliable electrical service, we maintain the rights-of-way under and around our power lines. We do this through rights-of-way and vegetation management. This requires pruning, removing, and cutting brush to prevent vegetation from interrupting your electric service.
